## What is Assistive Technology (AT)?

Devices and services that allow people to function as independently as possible at home, at school, at work and in the community are known as Assistive Technology.

## **Assistive Technology includes:**

- Wheelchairs and motorized scooters
- Hearing aids
- Magnifiers and other visual aids
- **■** Computers with modifications
- Control/switches for lights, doors and appliances
- Vehicles with lifts or hand controls
- Home modifications (for example, kitchen or bath redesign, ramps and/or widened doorways)
